2. Shizuoka (chosen by 8 students)

Next, we go from a far away prefecture to one that is close to Tokyo. Shizuoka Prefecture is only 30 minutes away from Tokyo by shinkansen, so it's very easy to visit for a short holiday. My favourite sight in Shizuoka is Dogashima, which has beautiful caves(洞窟) that you can visit by boat. Atami is also very famous for its hot springs and beach views.







3. Niigata (chosen by 7 students)
